Dear Friend,



### Who We Are

OneChild is an international child development ministry that helps meet the physical and spiritual needs of children living in poverty. We empower children to reach their God-given potential by creating opportunities for transformational development: spirit, mind and body. Through our global community of sponsors, donors, and local partners, children receive food, education, medical aid, and hope in God.

### How We Work

OneChild has church-based Hope Centers in some countries and Hope Center schools in others. We also provide critical care for trafficked girls in the Philippines and orphaned children in Kenya.

# BUILDING RESILIENCE THROUGH CHALLENGES

*Child Champions show determination  
as they meet kids' needs and give  
them steadfast hope.*

If they could talk, the babies in Africa's New Life Home would share their stories of survival, rescue and hope. Mothers overburdened with poverty, some with HIV or disabilities, could not care for these helpless little ones. Some of the young girls and women were raped or panicked at the thought of raising an unplanned baby.

But OneChild's partner organization, New Life Home Trust, will not let these abandoned babies slip into the nation's mortality statistics. Each child is too precious for that. Too loved by the caring doctors, nurses, staff, and volunteers.

Last spring, COVID-19 forced the New Life Home in Nairobi, Kenya, to close its doors to external visitors and volunteers. In response, the New Life staff modeled heroic service and tender mercy. Instead of returning to their own children and families, these remarkable Child Champions sheltered in place with the vulnerable babies. Staying 24/7 at the home ensured extra protection against the coronavirus, especially for the weakest newborns.

"The move was humbling because [the staff] chose to stay with these young ones," the center's national director, Dr. Janet Mutinda, explained. "We cannot send these kids away because they have no homes and they never signed up to be abandoned. What more would I ask of humanity but be grateful for these awesome Child Champions who have chosen to care for the kids during this challenging time?"

Around the world, nothing — not even a year of COVID-19 — diminished the resolve of Child Champions and OneChild kids. From Bangladesh and Haiti to Nicaragua and Lebanon and nearly a dozen other nations in between, when the coronavirus entrenched the planet, Child Champions and OneChild kids dug deep and proved their grit.

In the Philippines, Hope Centers managed social media group pages to keep connected with children and their families. The families shared photos and videos of the kids completing their Hope Center lessons and participating in virtual games. Other Child Champions created a Sunday school program for the kids on a YouTube channel.

In the Dominican Republic, India and beyond, the global pandemic devastated incomes for daily low-wage earners. Generous sponsors and donors gave to a special Children's Crisis Fund, and Child Champions packaged and delivered emergency food supplies to at-risk families.

In Malindi, Kenya, most families live on less than a dollar a day and cannot afford soap. To help, Child Champions at Rehema Hope Center trained youth in the program to make gallons of liquid soap that was shared among 80 families. These youth then trained community members with this disease-fighting skill.

As the far-reaching effects of the pandemic linger worldwide, the caring medical teams, teachers, mentors, and countless other Child Champions continue to step up and stand strong. Their sacrifices and commitment make a way for tens of thousands of OneChild kids in poverty to thrive with even greater determination and steadfast hope.

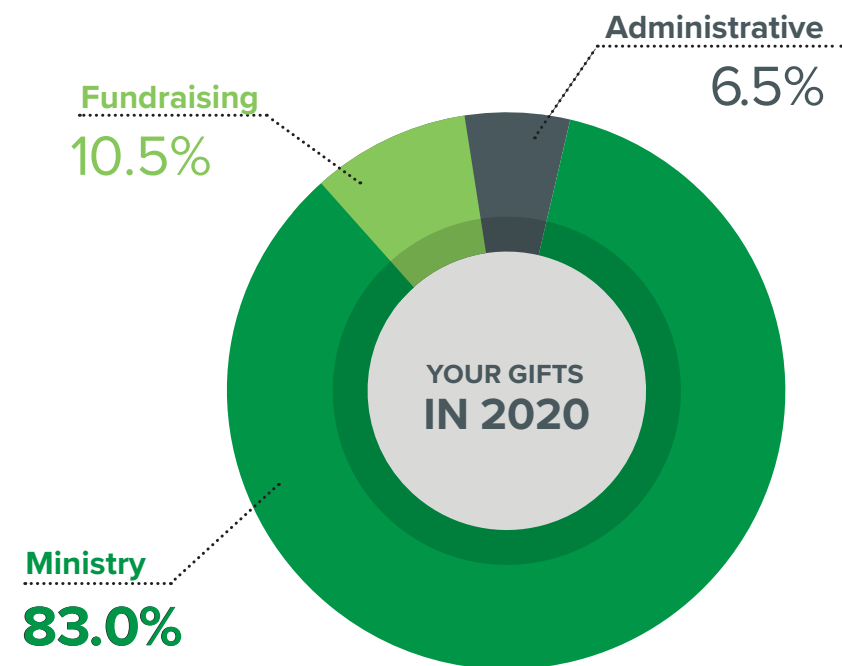






## HOW YOUR GIFTS WERE USED
